Office of Professional Standards

Internal Affairs

The Office of Professional Standards is responsible for safeguarding the integrity of the City of Bradenton and the Bradenton Police Department while closely monitoring the conduct of its officers and civilian staff. This section processed 42 complaints in 2020, which involved 45 officers and 4 civilians. Some complaints include several allegations. Below is a summary of the investigations:

While 37 complaint investigations have been completed and closed, 5 investigations initiated in 2020 remain active. Total number of allegations for these investigations is pending.

When misconduct of an employee is alleged, the complaint is investigated as one of three administrative investigation types.

Internal Affairs Investigation: A formal allegation of misconduct of a serious nature committed by an employee which requires an in-depth investigation.

Divisional Investigation: A formal allegation of misconduct of a more minor nature committed by an employee which requires a supervisory investigation.

Inquiry: Some complaints will be classified as an inquiry when it is shown there is no violation, or the complaint has been determined to be a procedural question from a citizen about the actions or inactions of an employee.

At the conclusion of each investigation, one of the following findings was determined for each allegation filed against Department employees:

Exonerated: The investigation revealed the acts which provided the basis for the complaint or allegations were justified, lawful, and proper.

Not Involved: Upon investigation, the employee was found to not be directly involved in the acts alleged.

Not Sustained: The investigation failed to disclose sufficient evidence to clearly prove the allegations made in the complaint.

Sustained: The allegations disclosed sufficient evidence to clearly prove the allegation made in the complaint.

Unfounded: The investigation conclusively proved that the allegations made in the complaint did not occur.

Of the 42 total investigations, 13 were complaints from citizens, and 29 were initiated by the Chief of Police.

Use of Force

The City of Bradenton Police Department mandates that when force is used in the line of duty the Officer is required to document their actions on a Use of Force Form. Use of Force should not be viewed as synonymous with excessive force. Force is an occasional and unfortunate outcome of the work that we ask the Officers of the Bradenton Police Department to perform on a daily basis. The Office of Professional Standards is responsible for collecting the data and conducting an annual analysis.

Between January 1 and December 31, 2020, the Bradenton Police Department was involved in 35,761 total calls for service. The data for 2020 indicates that the Bradenton Police Department had to apply force in less than .05 percent of all service calls.

In 2020, 167 Use of Force Forms were completed. Of the 167 completed Use of Force Reports, 89 suspects were involved. 74 suspects were arrested and 15 suspects were not arrested.

Legal Unit

The Legal Unit provides counsel to the Chief and the Department and ensures that the Department stays apprised of current legal issues, statutory changes, and case law of significance to law enforcement. Forfeiture is a crucial component of the Legal Unit, which decreases crime by depriving a criminal of property used to commit an offense or acquired through illegal activity. In 2020, the Bradenton Police Department seized \$10,592.46 in State Asset Forfeiture and \$177,708.04 in Federal Equitable Forfeiture.

As part of our commitment to community policing and engagement, the agency must donate at least 25% of State Forfeiture funds to community organizations and programs each year. After allocating necessary funds for proceeding-related court costs, we were able to donate \$24,425 in 2020 to programs benefitting the citizens of Bradenton. Accreditation Unit

Accreditation is an extensive process developed to inspect law enforcement agencies to determine if they are using "best practices" in policing, policies, and procedures. As professionalism is the forefront of all operations, the Accreditation Unit is responsible for maintaining files that prove the department's compliance with the Commission for Florida Law Enforcement Accreditation. As an accredited agency, we are committed to law enforcement excellence by complying with standards deemed essential to the protection of life, health, safety, and the rights of citizens. We strive to maintain an excellent level of service. Although accreditation is voluntary, it is an ongoing process to ensure our citizens that we are providing quality service which meet standards

recognized by the commission. The Bradenton Police Department has achieved its most recent accredited status in October 2018 and is working towards compiling the needed documentation for our current Accreditation Cycle, ending July 2021.

Training



Physical fitness is paramount for our personnel

BPD has continued to remain vigilant of CDC guidelines and the constant COVID-19 battle. In doing so, we have continued efforts to maintain training for personnel and have committed over 6,700 hours of advanced training while maintain certifications required by FDLE. Moving forward in training, unconventional techniques have been adopted and quickly become a norm such as: Zoom Video, conference calls, e-learning, and smaller in-person classes for officers where social distancing is a mandate for safety. Some areas highlighted this year were: Crisis Intervention, Officer Safety, Use of Force De-escalation Techniques, and Personal Protective (Safety) Equipment.

The Explorer Post is dedicated to providing community service and has participated in a variety of events, including details at Hunsader Farms, Fill the Truck Toy Drive, Honoring the Badge, CrimeStoppers Halloween Event, Boat Regatta, and Hurricane Expo. It is our goal to further the relationship between young adults in areas of grooming, integrity, discipline, perseverance, and character, while helping to develop a career in law enforcement. Explorers meet once a week for classroom instruction and hands on training.

Operations Division

The Operations Division is made up of Patrol and Patrol Support (Criminal Investigations), and they are committed to providing the citizens of Bradenton with professional and courteous service. While each has unique roles and responsibilities, they collaborate as one team to make our City a safe place in which to live, work, and visit. Patrol, the largest Unit within the Police Department, is most often associated with marked police vehicles and officers driving throughout the City. This group also has officers riding bicycles, ATVs, golf carts, and conducting patrols on foot. They respond to and solve a diverse set of law enforcement-related issues and concerns. They also continue to work closely with our community by attending Neighborhood Association Meetings, Community Squad Meetings, and special events, which afford them the opportunity to discuss real-life issues with our residents and business owners. During 2020, these communication meetings continued, albeit in some circumstances through emails, phone and video conferencing due to COVID-19 safety precautions.

Crime statistics decreased significantly again this year City-wide. Mitigating factors for this reduction in crime can be attributed to a variety of factors. Patrol Support, which includes the Criminal Investigations Section, Narcotics Unit, and the Special Investigations Unit, pride themselves on seeing this decrease continue. They use advanced technology in their investigations such as phone data mining, DNA and Fingerprint identification, private and public video cameras, and searching through the ever-changing social media platforms. They also rely on both internal and external partners, which range from their counterparts in Patrol, the State Attorney's Office, both state and federal law enforcement agencies, and our community. Each are invaluable in contributing to our crime fighting efforts.

Operations Division – Patrol

This year brought significant change to the Patrol Division. The COVID-19 pandemic changed how our agency responded to citizen calls for service and highlighted the importance of our employees' wellbeing. In March, we established protocols to limit our officers' exposure by utilizing Alternate Police Report Writing. Instead of physically responding to the scene for a minor criminal complaint not requiring evidence processing, the officer would telephone the complainant and handle the call over the phone. This has worked well throughout the pandemic and has limited exposure while still providing service.

Additionally, the Department was recently awarded funds to hire three new officers to enhance our community policing, crime prevention, and partnerships, granted under the COPS Hiring Grant through the Department of Justice. This grant's goals include reducing violent crimes, domestic violence, opioid overdoses/deaths, and confronting human trafficking. Through professionalism, courage, and transparency, our agency will strive to reduce the number of crimes, victims, and repeat offenders within the City of Bradenton. To ensure long-lasting results, agency members will also partner with local organizations to connect needs within the community to providers that can help residents in their time of need while empowering the community to solve lasting problems.

Support Services Section – DTU, CRA, HOT

The Bradenton Police Department Downtown Unit consists of two officers and a Sergeant who conduct foot, bicycle, and ATV patrols of the downtown area. The Unit works in conjunction with the City's Downtown Development Authority, as well as the Old Main Street Merchants Association, Bradenton Riverwalkers, and Realize Bradenton. Along with the day to day operations of patrolling, the Unit also provides assistance to the homeless citizens of Bradenton through our Homeless Outreach Team (HOT). This last year, with funding assistance from the US Housing and Urban Development, HOT successfully provided assistance to 58 people, including 10 families, through housing and transportation assistance. This vital program has proven successful again and again.

Crime Prevention Officer

The Crime Prevention Officer is assigned to the Downtown Unit and is responsible for developing and implementing various crime prevention, safety, and community outreach programs within the City of Bradenton. The Officer works closely with businesses, community organizations, and neighborhood groups to provide crime prevention training and safety education, as well as coordinates Neighborhood Watch Programs, the Homeless Outreach Program, and the Business Trespass Program. The Crime Prevention Officer provides training to businesses and individuals in Active Shooter Response, Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED), and more. The Crime Prevention Officer endeavors to partner with our community to prevent crime and provide a safer, better future for Bradenton.

Traffic Unit

The Bradenton Police Department has three officers and a Sergeant assigned to the Traffic Unit. The goals of the Traffic Unit are to ensure the safety and well-being of the citizens of Bradenton by reducing injuries, deaths, and economic losses resulting from motor vehicle crashes and to enhance citizen education, understanding and satisfaction of police traffic services. The Traffic Unit primarily focuses on enforcement, analysis, crash reduction and reconstruction as well as public education and public relations.

In 2020, the Bradenton Police Department was awarded four grants to positively impact traffic issues involving crash-related injuries and fatalities. These grants were made possible by funding from the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) and National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) and range from Impaired Driving (\$20,000), High Visibility Enforcement Pedestrian & Bicycle (\$25,000), Speed & Aggressive Driving (\$30,000) and a Drug Recognition Evaluation Classification Program grant (\$1,500). BPD has also partnered with MADD and the Manatee County School District to provide impairment outreach education and resources to middle and high school students.

School Resource Officers

The Bradenton Police Department School Resource Officer Unit is comprised of five officers serving three public schools in the City of Bradenton, Manatee Elementary School, Sugg Middle School and Manatee High School. Combined, the SRO Unit oversees more than three thousand students.

School Resource Officers do more than just patrol the school campus to which they are assigned. They instruct and create awareness for law-enforcement education related to school safety, monitor school visitors, provide assistance with disruptive students, enforce school rules, and supervise the entire school campus. During the COVID-19 pandemic, the School Resource Officers were instrumental in assisting the schools with the distribution of technology equipment and transitioning the students to virtual learning. School Resource Officers are also called upon to educate parents and faculty on personal safety, traffic safety, and law. They are the first contact with law enforcement for many children. The Bradenton Police Department's SRO Unit prides itself on making that first contact a positive and lasting one.

One of the highlights of the year is our chance to partner with AAA and our local schools to acknowledge young student leaders as Safety Patrol Officers. As school-age leaders in traffic safety, they teach other students about safety on a peer-to-peer basis. They also serve as models for the younger children who look up to them. This year's presentation of badges included 59 fifth graders from Miller Elementary and Moody Elementary.

K-9 Unit

The Bradenton Police Department Canine (K-9) Unit is staffed by five Certified K-9 Teams. Officer K.B. Magown II is partnered with K-9 Maverick, a Black Lab. K-9 Maverick is a single-purpose K-9 whose specialty is Explosive Ordinance Detection. Officer Matthew Palmer is Partnered with K-9 Murtaugh, a German Shepard. Officer Brandon Smolarz is Partnered with K-9 Drax, a Belgian Malinois. K-9 Murtaugh and K-9 Drax are both multi-purpose K-9s whose jobs

include Apprehension, Narcotics Detection, and Tracking. Detective Lixa Moyett is partnered with K-9 Liberty, a Bloodhound. K-9 Liberty is a single-purpose K-9 whose specialty is Search and Rescue.


As an invaluable asset to the Patrol Division, the Canine (K-9) Unit was deployed 85 times in 2020. In those deployments, the K-9 Unit conducted K-9 Tracks, Vehicle Detection for Narcotics, Building/Area/Article Searches, EOD Sweeps, and assists to other agencies.

Special Event Response Team (SERT)

The Special Event Response Team (SERT) is a Unit that comes together when needed and is comprised of 20 officers who are trained in mass arrest situations, special event disruption, and other unusual events, such as natural disasters. SERT members train on a bi-monthly basis and conduct annual inter-agency training with regional teams.

SERT is also responsible for two Department of Defense "Hummers" acquired by the Bradenton Police Department under the 10-33 program. While we hopefully never need these vehicles for a high water rescue, we have utilized them as a community outreach tool that many citizens have enjoyed seeing at events throughout the year.

Marine Unit

The Bradenton Police Department Marine Unit currently has six officers and one Lieutenant assigned to it as part-time positions. The Unit is responsible for policing the waterways within the City of Bradenton and providing aid to local, state, and federal agencies with enforcement issues in addition to search and rescue efforts. In 2020, the Unit conducted 47 traffic stops on vessels, engaged in 12 waterway assist calls and removed four vessels due to city ordinance violations. The Marine Unit also participated in several large area events throughout the year.

The City of Bradenton is bordered by approximately 14 miles of waterways, which are comprised of the Manatee River, Tampa Bay, Intercostal Waterway, and the Palma Sola Causeway.

Operations Division – Patrol Support

Patrol Support is commanded by Captain William Knight and consists of the Criminal Investigations Section, the Special Investigations Unit, and the Narcotics Unit. This year, Patrol Support continued to combat the ongoing opioid crisis that has plagued our community for several years. As such, the agency has spear headed the attack against this issue by becoming the lead agency for the Bradenton-Sarasota area HIDTA Program. HIDTA is a Drug Prohibition Enforcement Program, overseen by the United States Office of National Drug Control Policy. Joining this program allows multiple agencies to work together and provides greater resources to battle the issue.

Patrol Support detectives have worked diligently to assure victims have had resolution to the crimes committed against them or their property in 2020. By doing so they were able to lower violent crime by 11.2% and non-violent crime by 18.9% compared to 2019.

Criminal Investigations Section

The Criminal Investigations Section (CIS) currently has twelve full-time Detectives who investigate persons, property, fraud (financial and or identity), missing persons and crimes against children. CIS Detectives are also assigned to the Manatee County Homicide Investigations Taskforce and the FBI Taskforce. During this year, the Section investigated five homicides, one of which was determined justified and not considered for UCR stats. CIS Detectives also closed 60% of simple assaults and 50% of all violent crimes within the City.

A Civilian Analyst is also staffed in the Criminal Investigations Section whose responsibilities are to recognize and map crime patterns and trends in local and regional criminal activity. The analyst also creates and distributes intelligence information from internal and external sources which assists in the monitoring and prevention of criminal activity.

Special Investigations Unit

The Special Investigations Unit (SIU) of the Criminal Investigations Division is responsible for conducting both narcotics and felony criminal investigations. Members are trained in narcotics investigation and surveillance tactics and conduct both active and undercover investigations to attempt to identify, arrest, and charge persons involved in illegal drug manufacture or trafficking. Many of the investigations they conduct result in the arrest of persons responsible for the trafficking of illegal drugs. Throughout the year SIU has apprehended multiple violent offenders from robberies, shootings, burglaries, and drug sales.

Narcotics Unit

The Bradenton Police Department Narcotics Unit's primary goal is to enforce the illegal act of prostitution and the use/sale of illegal narcotics. Out of the seven members on the Narcotics Unit, one Detective is assigned to the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) Task Force and five Detectives are Task Force Officers with Homeland Security (HSI). The Bradenton Police Department has recently joined the HIDTA Program with the Sarasota/Tampa Division. The Narcotics Unit will continue to investigate long and short term investigations, citizen complaints, Crime Stopper tips, and over dose deaths from the opium/fentanyl crisis. The Narcotics Unit consistently partners with several outside agencies which includes FBI, Coast Guard, ATF, JTTF, FDLE, IRS, Customs and Border Protection, as well as local law enforcement agencies.

Honor Guard

The Bradenton Police Department Honor Guard has been active for over 34 years. Unit personnel participate at functions such as parades, ceremonies, and charitable causes. Originally established to provide honors for officers killed in the line of duty, it is now recognized as the Department's official ceremonial Unit. Multifaceted, the group performs duties such as traditional color guard functions, as well as coordinating and participating in the intricate details inherent to line of duty deaths for fallen law enforcement officers. Last year, they represented the agency at the virtual Manatee County Fallen Officer Memorial, law enforcement funerals, flag retirements, and presenting the nation's colors at public events, among other activities.

Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT) Team and Hostage Negotiation Team (HNT)

The Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT) Team is a highly trained Unit equipped to deal with high risk situations, such as hostage rescue, fugitive apprehension and "active shooters." The Bradenton SWAT Team members serve on a part-time basis. During the last year, the SWAT Team was requested for several calls for service and served nine high priority search warrants.

The operators of the Hostage Negotiation Team are trained negotiators who de-escalate potential life-threatening situations by using verbal crisis management techniques. The Team works with the Department's SWAT Team by responding to crisis incidents involving individuals who are emotionally distraught, suicidal, armed/barricaded, or in a potential hostage situation. The primary goal of the Team is to mitigate crisis incidents while attempting to avoid unnecessary risk to citizens, victims, and officers. The Team currently serves on a part-time basis and has seven active members.

Administrative Services Division

The Administrative Services Division includes Communications, Crime Scene Investigations, Fiscal and Personnel Services, Property and Evidence, Records, Digital Media, Building Maintenance, School Crossing Guards, Front Desk Operations/City Hall Security, and our Volunteers. The Division is headed by Assistant Chief Josh Cramer and mainly staffed by our Department's civilian employees, most of whom are under the command of Lieutenant Jeremy Giddens, Executive Officer of the Administrative Services Division.

The duties of the Records Section includes gathering and distributing multiple pieces of information within the criminal justice system – from paperwork to digital files to outside agency requests. A crucial component of their function includes processing all public records requests in a timely fashion and accordance with state law.

The BPD Communications Center dispatches calls for service for the Bradenton Police and Fire Departments. The Center handles all incoming 911 calls. The Communications staff understands the need to provide professional, considerate assistance to those calling to request services. Separately, Front Desk operations include call-taking, as well as staffing of the City Hall Security Officer.

Investigators of the Crime Scene Unit respond to major crime scenes for the photographing and processing of evidence. Equipment within the CSI Lab allows investigators to follow-up their on-scene investigations, helping them solve crimes and properly preserve evidence for use in court.

Personnel within the Property and Evidence Section collect all incoming property and evidence submitted during investigations. Clerks label, categorize, and store the items within secured areas to maintain chain-of-custody. These items remain there until needed for court or until they can be lawfully disposed of.

The Fiscal and Personnel Services staff coordinates the entry and approval of payroll, requisitions, purchasing, and Human Resources issues. They also serve as liaisons for City Hall.

Building Maintenance has been one of the most important duties during 2020, especially due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Staff have been focused on making the interior of our Department and all Departmental vehicles as safe and sanitary as possible while still remaining a fully staffed operation.

The information noted above generally describes the Administrative Services Division. Our personnel provide professional services daily by the personnel assigned to the Division mirrors their vigorous work ethic and dedication to duty, vital to the efficient operation of the Bradenton Police Department.



Communications

The Communications Section is often the first contact for the citizens of Bradenton to its Police Officers and Firefighters. The Section is staffed 24/7 and answers 911, emergency, and non-emergency calls while dispatching for the Bradenton Police and Fire Departments. Their mission is to help others, often calling in a moment of absolute need. This demanding profession requires highly technical, skilled work. In order to be successful – needed on every call – a Dispatcher must be an expert listener, but also highly professional and competent. Often referred to as a "calm voice in the darkness," our staff is so much more; they are the first, First Responders. We are extremely proud and fortunate to have such a hard-working group of individuals who have dedicated themselves to this component of Public Safety.

In 2020, our Communications Section answered 15,897 Emergency 911 calls. They entered a total of 90,813 calls for service for the Bradenton Police Department, and 6,210 calls for service for the Bradenton Fire Department.

The Bradenton Police Department Crime Scene Unit is staffed by two civilian Crime Scene Investigators under the supervision of the Lead Crime Scene Investigator, Jessica Harris. The CSI staff are available every hour of every day to provide services as needed for investigations. CSI responds to crime scenes ranging from burglaries to homicides, but are trained to adapt to a multitude of calls for service. Their responsibilities include photography, scene documentation, latent fingerprint processing, and evidence collection and preservation. During the COVID-19 pandemic, CSI personnel were required to be extra vigilant in their use of PPE to protect themselves. In lieu of in-person training, online classes and webinars were made available to keep the staff well trained in current and developing scene and evidence processing techniques. In 2020, the Crime Scene Unit responded to over 263 individual crime scenes, and processed over 127 evidence service requests for evidence submitted to the I.D. Lab. In 2020, the Crime Scene Unit uploaded photographs for approximately 1,313 cases from the Patrol and Patrol Support Divisions, and fulfilled over 758 requests for copies of photographs.

Property and Evidence

The Property and Evidence Unit is responsible for storing, tracking and maintaining all items taken into police custody. The Unit consists of two Evidence Custodians under the supervision of the Property and Evidence Lead Custodian, Jessica Harris.

As of the end of 2020, the Property and Evidence Unit has custody of a combined total of approximately 42,918 property and evidence items. In calendar year 2020, the Unit received 5,892 property and evidence items, returned 425 items to their rightful owners, and donated 252 unclaimed items to local charities. The Property and Evidence Unit destroyed a total of 7,328 items that were not returnable and were no longer of value to the investigative or judicial process.

Records

The Records Section is responsible for the processing and disseminating of all Investigative, Supplemental, and Traffic Reports written by personnel within the Police Department. The Records Section processed 10,196 reports in 2020. The Records Unit consists of one Lead Clerk, Maria Cadena, and four Records Clerks. In addition to regular police records produced by officers and detectives, fulfilling public record requests is a major function of the Section. In total, the Records Section was responsible for the processing, dissemination, and fulfillment of over 3,898 public records requests in 2020. Staff are responsible for categorizing records to maintain as well as identifying and isolating records available for destruction according to state records retention requirements.

Digital Media

Our Digital Media Coordinator works with officers and staff to convey a positive image for our Department. One way this is accomplished is through robust and continually active departmental social media accounts.

Twitter is used for alerts that may directly affect the general public or may need public notification. Facebook is where the public can find images from recent events, learn more about

safety through our posted safety graphics and videos, learn more about our Officers through Q&A videos, and see what is happening around the station. Instagram is utilized as a "scrapbook," showing the public who our officers are. In 2020, the Department Facebook gained 4,217 new followers, while the Department Twitter account received 850 new likes.

Parking

The Parking Unit primarily focuses on enforcement in the Downtown area. Areas of responsibility include the City's parking regulations, tracking of issued citations, and citation payment collections. These functions are conducted by a Parking Enforcement Specialist, under the supervision of the Lieutenant of the Administrative Services Division. All sworn Bradenton Police Department personnel also enforce the City's parking regulations, but in a broader effort citywide.

During the 2020 calendar year, there were 2,826 parking citations issued. Although operated by the Bradenton Police Department, all parking fines and fees collected are deposited into the City of Bradenton's General Fund.

Crossing Guards

This was a challenging year for the Bradenton Police Department's School Crossing Guards. The SCG team is tasked with ensuring the safe roadway crossing of the City's school children; however, with the COVID-19 Pandemic, all schools were not open for a portion of the 2019-20 school year. Our Guards, despite wearing masks, still provided a friendly face to students needing to access school areas for WiFi or meal service. As of the start of the 2020-21 school year, the School Crossing Guard team consists of 15 assigned crossing guards and one fill-in guard. The School Crossing Guards are a dedicated group, with our most senior School Crossing Guard in her 35th year of service, exhibiting clear dedication to her students. The Department is constantly updating the School Crossing Guards equipment and uniforms to improve safety for the guards, children, and the motoring public.


Volunteers







In Memoriam – Chief Michael Radzilowski



This year the Department was saddened by the passing of Chief Michael Radzilowski (Retired), who passed in November at the age of 70 following a brave battle with cancer. Chief Radzilowski, or Chief Razz, as he was more familiarly known, began his law enforcement career in 1970 serving as a patrol officer with the Metropolitan Police Department in Washington, DC. He worked his way through the ranks, retiring in 2001 at the rank of Commander of the Special Operations Division. In 2002 he was chosen by Mayor Wayne Poston to become Chief of the Bradenton Police Department. During his tenure Chief Radzilowski emphasized the importance of professionalism and organization in the Department. He also began several programs to increase community engagement with the citizens of Bradenton. One of the most notable, and one very close to his heart, was the Honoring the Badge program in partnership with Kingdom Life Church. During this holiday event Chief Razz would frequently come out of his own pocket to help buy Christmas gifts for underserved children. This is a tradition we still hold to this day, with the program just celebrating its twelfth year. He retired from the Bradenton Police Department in 2016, concluding a fulfilling and impactful 45 year career in law enforcement.

Chief Radzilowski is survived by his wife Elizabeth, daughter Lauren, sons Ryan, Jeff, and Michael, five grandchildren, and five siblings.

In Memoriam – Sergeant James Kaull



Our Department sustained an unexpected loss this year with the sudden passing of Sergeant James Kaull in May. Sergeant Kaull started his law enforcement career in 1994 as a Deputy with the Manatee County Sheriff's Office, serving there until 2001 as a Field Training Officer and member of the Hostage Negotiations Team and the Disaster Response Team. He began his tenure with the Bradenton Police Department in 2002. His service included time as a Field Training Officer, then recognized as a Master Patrol Officer in 2009 due to his tenure and experience. In 2011 Sergeant Kaull was promoted to the rank of Sergeant and served as a supervisor in the Patrol Division. In 2018 Sergeant Kaull transferred to the Property and Evidence Section, where he found his niche in his assignment supervising Property & Evidence, CSI, and the School Crossing Guards, serving in that role until his passing at the age of 54. He was very dedicated, passionate, and enthusiastic when it came to his position at BPD. He had a depth of knowledge and experience to offer the Department and was commended by our Department and outside agencies alike.

Sgt. Kaull is survived by his wife Myung, daughter Ivy, and numerous family members and friends.
